Dear Secretary Yellen:

As a Member of the House Financial Services Committee, I look forward to establishing a stronger and more open line of communications with the U.S. Department of Treasury in the 118th Congress on matters relating to illicit finance, corruption, and economic sanctions.

As I am sure you will agree, it important as the United States and our allies continue to apply increased economic pressure on Russia for its unlawful invasion of Ukraine. Unfortunately, we are seeing all too frequent circumvention of those sanctions by Russian actors and their close associates despite the Administration's commitment to "support the rule of law and impose costs on public officials and those connected to them who use government institutions for personal profit." As you know, much of the malign Russian influence is centered in southeastern Europe, including amongst NATO countries such as Bulgaria.

In its decision to sanction influential Bulgarian individuals and their networks, the Office of Foreign Assets Control ("OFAC") noted that the designated individuals blackmailed sitting ministers "with criminal charges from Bulgaria's Prosecutor General's office if the minister did not provide [...] further assistance upon appointment." The weaponization of the high office of prosecutors in favor of organized crime and corruption is a serious threat to the stability of an important NATO ally and generally, the Balkan region. Regretfully, we have only seen escalation in the misconduct of Bulgarian judiciary since the Senate Foreign Relations Committee had issued a bipartisan statement condemning "persistent corruption, declining media freedom, politicization of the judiciary."

The reports of corrupt actions of the Bulgarian Prosecutor General, Ivan Geshev, are of particular concern. The European Court of Human Rights has found repeated and serious violations of fundamental rights triggered by expropriatory actions against banking institutions<sup>4</sup> conducted directly, or indirectly, under supervision of the Prosecutor General's office. Bulgarian critical infrastructure and defense companies are routinely transferred to Russian sanctioned banks and other corrupt elements in spite of sanctions.<sup>5</sup> Just days ago, the Council of Europe, the highest body supervising the execution of judgments of the European Court of Human Rights, remarked on "the systemic problem of ineffective criminal investigations, as well as the lack of independence of criminal investigations concerning the Chief Prosecutor" and invited criminal investigations against the Prosecutor General himself.<sup>6</sup>

Furthermore, investigative journalists had to be warned by the US embassy of imminent threat to bodily harm<sup>7</sup> just days after they had reported about corruption allegations against the sitting Prosecutor General.<sup>8</sup> Perhaps most disturbing, the Bulgarian courts seemingly followed Prosecutor General refusal to act against sanctioned individuals, and recently declared U.S. sanctions imposed under Global Magnitsky Human Rights Accountability Act ("Magnitsky Act") ineffective and without legal power in the Republic of Bulgaria.<sup>9</sup> The Bulgarian prosecution a few months later terminated all investigations and measures against the Bulgarian nationals sanctioned by the US.<sup>10</sup>

These actions directly threaten the stability and security of NATO allies in Europe and aim to undermine Magnitsky Act which has become one of the most effective tools available to the U.S. government against foreign officials and shady businesses involved in corrupt practices and human rights abuses. The blatant disregard of U.S. sanctions by the Bulgarian Prosecutor General is unacceptable and must be addressed.
